Avoiding the Detours: Early Childhood education writes the road map to a lifetime of learning

Imagine you have just arrived in Abuja, Nigeria, ready for an adventure, when you realize that you don't have your vacation materials with you. Your mobile phone doesn't work here; you don't speak the language, and you haven't the slightest idea of how to get to your hotel. As a resourceful adult, you try your best to communicate with locals around you to gather information. Still, you're in a foreign environment; the cultural rules aren't certain; you're acting on instinct, and you're hoping that you find someone — anyone — to provide you with guidance. Logically, you know you would navigate much more efficiently with assistance from someone who knows the basics, such as where you want to go and how you can best arrive there, and you attempt to seek this person out of the crowd. You hope luck is on your side today...

It may seem like a strange analogy, but prekindergarten (pre-K) programming, for our youngest learners, serves the same purpose as the critical vacation materials would have to the ill-fated traveler. Pre-kindergarten education establishes the groundwork of student learning at a time in which children are developmentally ready to get started. The precise timing, tools, and talent used to educate pre-school children provides the master "map" to help them transition throughout their educational journey successfully.

National educators have recognized the importance of early education for years. In a 2010 study published in Teachers College Record entitled "Meta-Analysis of the Effects of Early Education Interventions on Cognitive and Social Development," researcher Gregory Camilli and his team conducted an analysis of 123 pre-K programs. The study looked back at decades of early education data to capture and synthesize a full body of research. They found that these programs provide a real and enduring benefit to children, a benefit which persists beyond the early elementary years. Students participating in a pre-K program are less likely to have truancy issues later in their school careers, more likely to graduate, better-prepared to keep up with the pace of classroom work, and able to perform

Harrisburg Academy is committed to teaching responsively and to providing a personalized, individual experience for each of its students. This differentiates and makes the school's Early Childhood program a true resource in the Harrisburg area, starting with Harrisburg Academy Threes (HATS).

"Research done on early childhood programs and their effect on a student's learning shows that the better programs kids have, the better they do later in life and even into their careers," said Elaine Price, Harrisburg Academy kindergarten teacher. "We see this here at the Academy. Our students learn prereading and fine motor skills in HATS class. They are reading and writing well by kindergarten and 1st grade because of what they have learned when they were three or four years old."

In HATS, students learn the routine of what occurs in school. They work on listening skills and verbalizing clearly what they want to convey to a fellow student or their teacher. They learn about the weather, the seasons, how to stay healthy, and how dinosaurs ruled Earth, for example. They are given structure but are also provided with ample time for play. With structure, they "know what to expect, so they become confident in being themselves," said Kelly Seely, HATS teacher. HATS students also are encouraged to follow their innate curiosity. "We try to teach the children through all of their senses," said HATS teacher Nancy Bowman. "We have a discovery table so the kids can touch things. They learn about quantity, texture, and more at this center."

An article in the April 2011 edition of Education Week magazine discussed the importance of independent play, but also the benefit of letting students' curiosities guide learning. The magazine interviewed University of California, Berkeley, researcher Alison Gopnik, author of "The Philosophical Baby." Gopnik believes that young children actually are doing science, in a sense, when they play and explore. The best thing educators can do to encourage this learning is to pay attention to their students' interests and to follow their lead based on evident classroom curiosities and the questions they are asking. Providing "open-ended" play opportunities, such as the Bowman's discovery table, stimulates children and prepares them to be ample and ready learners as the lessons get more challenging.

As students move up to junior kindergarten (JK), education builds upon what was established in HATS. The students continue to work on adhering to routines, using language, and following directions. In JK, the teachers encourage them to be more independent.

"When they play, we sit back and listen to the conversations," said JK teacher Jackie Stabach. "We encourage them to figure out how to interact with each other by themselves. They learn that they are responsible for the classroom and everything in it. If there is a problem, they are responsible for using the tools they have been taught to figure things out."

JK students work on perfecting the upper and lower case alphabet, learn how to play the violin, and are exposed to their first taste of Spanish. They also start to learn about famous artists and try their hand at re-creating famous masterpieces.

"You wouldn't believe the interest they have in fine art," Stabach said. "By the end of the unit, they know the artists and the styles. It really sets the basis for starting the school's formalized art class curriculum in kindergarten."

By the time children advance to kindergarten at Harrisburg Academy, they are accustomed to demonstrating correct school behavior because

they know what is expected of them. They have become confident writers who are able to express clearly what they are thinking, are problem-solvers who love to engage in class, and are young global citizens who are interested in studying about other cultures and other living things.

They ARE the classroom," said kindergarten teacher Karla Sherman. "They give us great ideas to enhance activities. This is generated from their years of experience here at school and feeling comfortable enough to

The understated value of a Harrisburg Academy Early Childhood education isn't always seen immediately, but according to Price, parents oftentimes have a sudden realization when their student gets to kindergarten.

"For those parents whose children have gone through HATS and JK here, they suddenly realize what these programs have done for their child, and that the reason their child is where he or she is now, developmentally, is because these early years have prepared them for this," Price said.

"Parents only have more appreciation the further their child progresses with his or her education here. We foster an inquisitive mind, a love of learning, an understanding of respect, and socialization skills so that these kids can be the best that they can be. These attributes will be valuable for the rest of their careers, not just for this moment!" she added.



"Community dedicated to education" continues to inspire McCormick Medalist

"What is special about the Academy is that it is not just a community to which you belong. It's a community where you feel that you belong," said Helen McVey Colvin '60 as she accepted the highest honor bestowed by Harrisburg Academy, the McCormick Medal, on May 15 at the school's Founders Day celebration. Colvin should know - she is a woman who not only has dedicated her life to growing the success of the Academy community in a variety of capacities, but follows seven generations of family members who studied at the school (the oldest being great-grandfather W.O. Hickok, Jr. who attended in the 1850s and 1860s).

Colvin was raised in Central Pennsylvania from age six until adulthood. She attended Harrisburg Academy (100 years after Great-Grandfather Hickok!) and finish her high school education at Westover School in Middlebury, Conn. Colvin attended Vassar College in the heart of New York's Hudson Valley. With a degree in political science (with a focus in pre-law) complete, Colvin moved back to Harrisburg, married husband H. Riley Colvin, Jr., and started a family.

The inspiration of education caught Colvin's interest in 1979 when she returned to Harrisburg Academy to teach full-time. Her long tenure began when she accepted a position as an unpaid aide in Marlynn Meyer's 1st grade class. During this time, Colvin took some preliminary education classes as Shippensburg University to earn teaching certification. She eventually joined the faculty at the Academy, teaching 6th grade and later, 2nd grade, 3rd grade, and 5th grade math and science until her retirement in 1998. She continues to substitute several days each year.

"What is special about the Academy is that there is a 'spark,'" Colvin said. "My 7th grade class would be reading a short story and two kids would have the interest to stay after class to talk with me about what we were learning. There's a wonderful sense of community. From the 10th grader listening to a 4th grader read to all of our grandparents here for Field Day — you belong to it. As a parent, I learned to appreciate the Academy for the firm foundation in education it gave our daughter, too," she added. Colvin's daughter, Ann Colvin Pierce '94, attended the Academy through Middle School.

Colvin thinks that the most important thing for children to experience is building their intellectual curiosity, confidence, and integrity. "That [building these traits] was something encouraged by the Academy both when I was a student and when I was a teacher," Colvin said. "As an educator, that's what you want to create - an atmosphere of curiosity focused towards the subject you're teaching. If the student can retain

that beyond Lower School and into Middle and Upper School, that's the greatest gift you can give him or her."

In addition to serving as a student, parent, and faculty member of Harrisburg Academy, Colvin has also volunteered time and service on its Board of Trustees. She served a term from 1970 to 1986, and presently is serving a second term (since 2009). She was the Board's vice president from 1974 to 1980, and was instrumental in helping with the development of the Academy's early strategic planning efforts. Colvin's accolades, in addition to being the 2011 McCormick Medalist recipient, are being named the Harrisburg Academy Alumna of the Year (1979), winning the Harrisburg Academy Trustee award (1996), being named as an ABC-27 "Class Act Teacher" (1997), and earning The Patriot-News' Teacher of the Month (mid-1990s). The McCormick Medal, however, is special.

"This is a lifetime achievement award," Colvin said. "I was so excited; it means a tremendous amount to me. I didn't expect to have a career here, but it's been really fun for me to be a part of this school as a student, alumna, parent, teacher, and Board member. You get a fascinating, multiperspective view of the school. And it's clearly a school I truly care about," she added.

Dr. Ruqayya Yasmine Khan '78 named Alumna of the Year

Dr. Ruqayya Yasmine Khan '78 received the Alumna of the Year award for outstanding professional achievements at the Class of 2011's Commencement exercises.

"You're about to embark on a journey of self-discovery," said Khan during her speech. "If there is one thing I wish I learned at your age, it is the following — to practice empathy to succeed in life and our 24/7 interconnected world."

Khan is an associate professor of Islamic studies at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas, where she practices this philosophy in her classroom and her research. In the past 30 years, Khan has built a career in higher education, both teaching and studying literature, psychology, religion, and more. She arrived at Trinity University in 2003, where she taught classes such as "Religion and Childhood," "Islam, Judaism and Christianity," "Women in Islam," and "The Qur'an." Prior to this, she was a visiting assistant professor at Swarthmore College and then, subsequently, at the University of California, Santa Barbara.

Khan's impressive research career includes interests such as Arabic literary studies, Qur'anic studies, psychology of religion, progressive Islamic theologies as well as religion and childhood. Her article, "'The Chambir of My Thought': Self and Conduct in a Ninth-Century Arabo-Islamic Ethical Treatise," recently was published in "History of Religions" (Aug., 2009 vol. 49, no.1), and her book, "Self and Secrecy in Early Islam," was published in September 2008 with the University of South Carolina Press. She has written several other

articles and book chapters.

In the spring of 2009 Khan conducted major research in Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) as a Fulbright Fellow at the Faculty of Islamic Studies, University of Sarajevo. She teamed up with a Bosnian colleague there to design a survey assessing Muslim youth attitudes towards religion. They applied this instrument in a twostage process, which generated raw data contained in more than 1,000 student surveys from public schools in BiH's capital city, Sarajevo. Khan and her Bosnian colleague are in the process of analyzing this data and publishing it.

During her years at Harrisburg Academy, Khan played Varsity Field Hockey, was on the yearbook staff, and participated in French club.

Khan completed her undergraduate studies at Goucher College in Baltimore and then undertook graduate training at the University of Pennsylvania, where she earned both her Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. Khan also spent time studying at the American University of Cairo in Egypt.

Outside of the office, Khan is a member of the American Academy of Religion and is an advisor for The Center for Spiritual Development in Childhood and Adolescence. She currently lives in San Antonio with her husband, John Sepich, and son, Mikail. She enjoys hiking, bird watching, gardening, the arts, and watching NBA games with her family.

Academy sings praises for Mary Russek '12 and Alex Walker '12, state-level music participants

March was the month for music at Harrisburg Academy — both Mary Russek '12 and Alex Walker '12 qualified for state-level music ensembles, an achievement notable for large high schools, let alone smaller independent institutions like the Academy. Both students performed with their respective state ensembles on April 16 at Good Shepherd Chapel at Lancaster Bible College.

Mary Russek – PMEA State Orchestra, Concertmaster

"Being able to participate in PMEA All-State Orchestra was the culmination of 14 years of hard work," Russek said. "The All-State Orchestra is an elite ensemble, and it gave me the opportunity to play with not only the top 30 1st violinists in the state, but also other top orchestra musicians. Being in that environment is fantastic; it was exciting to be with other students who have worked hard and are musically driven, like me — we had an immediate connection. Staying in the same hotel as all of the All-State groups (Vocal Jazz, Jazz Ensemble, Chorus, Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, and Orchestra) was an incredible experience, too, because it created a larger musically focused environment and allowed members of the different groups to interact," she said.

Russek has been playing violin since she was three years old. She is the second student in Academy history to advance to PMEA All-State Orchestra and the only student to earn concertmaster status. Russek auditioned for PMEA District 7 Orchestra and placed 14th out of 103 musicians. From here, she auditioned for Region IV-V Orchestra and was 4th out of 21 musicians. Then, she auditioned to advance to All-State Orchestra — and was ranked 3rd out of 20. At the State competition, she auditioned for placement within the orchestra and earned 1st Chair-1st Violin status, or concertmaster. As concertmaster, Russek's main role was to lead the orchestra by

tuning the group, changing bowings when necessary, and being the "bridge" between the conductor and the orchestra as a whole.

"I have many wonderful memories of the 2011 PMEA All-State Festival that will remain with me forever," Russek said. "I was fortunate to have a group of friends from Districts advance with me to Regionals and States and also enjoyed meeting new people from all over Pennsylvania along the way," she added.

Alex Walker - PMEA All-State Chorus

"I am really happy to be the first student to represent the Academy at an all-state chorus event," Walker said. "I feel like I have achieved my greatest potential in music, and for this, I am proud of myself."

Indeed, Walker is the first student in Harrisburg Academy's 226-year history to advance to the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) All-State Chorus. To reach this level, Walker first was chosen to participate in the 2011 PMEA Region V Choral Festival in February. Region V is comprised of over 150 school districts and 80 schools and directors participated. Walker auditioned against the top 26 Tenor II's in Region V and ranked 5th, which allowed him to advance to the All-State Chorus concert.

Learning young sets the stage for confidence and success

A small group of Harrisburg Academy's junior kindergarten (JK) students stand in a line — with surprising patience — feet balanced properly, instrument cases arranged in an orderly fashion, violins resting under their chins as they prepare to start the lesson. As Early Childhood / Lower School music teacher Abby Huffman cues them in, "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" drifts into the room.

"Music is very much like a language. Everybody progresses at different levels and that's alright," Huffman said. "When you start them young, they're absolutely natural. As they advance into older grades and harder, more complex music, they already have a base knowledge upon which they just keep building."

Harrisburg Academy's modified Suzuki strings program begins in JK. Students visit Huffman every other day for both a strings class and a general music class. They learn about the entire musical experience through modeling. Huffman demonstrates proper instrument care, how to remove the violins from their cases, and how to adjust the strings, and the mechanics of playing the instrument. When they first begin, their fine motor skills are still developing, so it takes time to learn how to hold the violin and to play it correctly. By the end of the school year, however, they are prepared to perform. "The students learn the value of the instrument and they are very respectful of it," Huffman said. "And by the end of the year, they are so excited to be able to play something," she added.

The strings program continues in kindergarten with the same frequency. Students learn more notes and have better finger dexterity. At the end of the year, students have the opportunity to continue playing the violin. Even though the Academy does not teach strings beyond kindergarten, its music department works to arrange private lessons for interested students. These students can then play in Harrisburg Academy's Lower School Orchestra, an after-school program also instructed by Huffman. Two years into their strings lessons, they are confident, knowledgeable, and ready to play music as a group.

State Street Music Academy instructor Joe McAnulty, a private instructor to several Harrisburg Academy students, believes if children are at the age in which they are learning to read and write, they can learn how to play any instrument. "I've noticed in my years of teaching, the ones who have

started earlier have so much more confidence playing outside of the classroom in my studio. They are self-assured at such an early age," he said. The love of music for Mitchell Mazza '20 became evident when he learned to play the violin in JK. "We were at an all-school gathering, and Mr. Gutwein had a group of kids that played a rock-type song on the guitar, and Mitchell was enthralled," said his mother, Pam Mazza. Though Mitchell began with violin and spent some time learning to play the guitar, his mother encouraged him to consider joining the Lower School Orchestra and to play a unique instrument. He picked the cello. "He really loves it — and he's good. When he first started playing it, the cello was a big as he was!" Pam Mazza added with a laugh.

The important developmental lessons learned thorough playing music extend beyond the stage and into the classroom, Huffman said. "My instruction really correlates to what they are learning with their teachers, such as letters, sounds, rhymes, patterns, and reading. The basis of language is reinforced through the music lessons I teach.'

Lower School Orchestra is helping Academy students, including Mitchell Mazza, learn and grow socially as well. "With the orchestra, having to get together with a group of different aged kids, Mitchell is learning to collaborate. That has helped him in the context of working in groups, to be aware that different people are at different levels," Pam Mazza said. "I didn't play music as a child. I never had that door opened, so with my sons, I wanted to open as many doors as I can. They love music and are learning so much," she added.

Current Global Issues course gives perspective at home

In a child's world, the concept of cause and effect is localized. "If I misbehave with the babysitter, I will lose my computer privileges;" or, "If I eat my green beans, I will be allowed to have dessert." Their "home," made up of house, school, town, and places their families frequent, is the extent of their world. Once these children grow into their teen years, however, a change begins to take place — they gain the ability to broaden their perspectives and to begin looking beyond themselves to see the larger scale of the world and the interconnectivity of those within it. Heather Jorgensen's Current Global Issues course, offered to 8th grade Academy students, pushes them to make considerations about our interconnected world and to realize that events occurring on one part of the planet have farreaching effects. "In order to really understand the world in which we live, it is important to use multiple perspectives, including an examination of the values, beliefs, and traditions of other cultures and civilizations from the past to the present," Jorgensen stated. "I try to present all sides of the issues.

The course, which has been derived from Jorgensen's research on individual unit topics, explores broad themes such as globalization, sustainability, population growth, food and water scarcity, and media bias. Over the course of a year, students learn and discuss factors that play into each theme, and they are assigned projects that stretch their scope of knowledge and scholastic abilities. On January 4, for instance, the students returned from Winter Break armed with knowledge about the process, procedure, and etiquette

of debating and details about a specific global topic — genetically modified organisms (GMOs). On this day, the class was prepared to engage in its first debate. The topic and the process of debate were new to the students, but they embraced learning both with enthusiasm.

Split into two groups, the students sat in tightly formed circles, scribbling notes as the opposing team took the floor to discuss the debate theme: "Genetically Engineered Foods (GMOs) Are Safe & Healthy."

The team arguing that genetically engineered foods are safe and healthy spoke about how GMOs make farmer crops more affordable, require the use of less pesticide, attract fewer bugs (creating less work for the farmers), and most importantly — have no negative financial effect on farmers even with a price difference in seeds because of government subsidies for the use of GMOs.

The team arguing against the safety and health of genetically engineered foods proposed that GMOs have negative effects on world agricultural communities because of having different bearings on different pocketed communities, and possible cross-breeding could introduce chemicals into the environment that may have unpredictable and uncontrollable effects. More importantly, the group expressed greater concern GMO-producing companies have patented their genetically modified seeds. Because of this, companies require farmers to sign contracts stating they will not perform independent research on the seed lines — which severely limits oversight.

Music to our Ears: Anika Raju '16 brings home Junior Grand Champion award at CASEF

A Winning Tune

Seventh grade student Anika Raju '16 earned first place and was named Junior Grand Champion at the 2011 Capital Area Science and Engineering Fair (CASEF) on March 5 at the Whitaker Center in Harrisburg. Raju's project, "Music and Emotions," explored how her classmates reacted to music played in different keys. Raju received a trophy and \$100.

The purpose of this project, Raju said, was to test if the key of a piece of music would affect a listener's emotions — she hypothesized that a larger number of subjects would feel happy, or similar emotions when listening to major keys and sad or similar emotions when listing to minor keys. Raju tested numerous subjects by playing them four pieces of music on her violin, three of which were transposed from an original piece. Two of the pieces were in a major key; two of the pieces were in a minor key. Each subject completed a survey while listening to the four pieces and answered questions about emotions while participating. Raju calculated the number of people for each emotion possibly felt to acquire the results.

What did she discover? Her research supported her hypothesis. A large number of subjects stated that major keys made them feel happy and minor keys made them feel sad. The key in which a piece of music is composed affects the emotions of the listener.

Science Fair projects at the Academy are completed over several months during the academic year under the instruction of science teachers, Tricia Britton and Lakshmi Shrikantia. Harrisburg Academy requires all Middle School students to participate in the school science fair. The strongest projects in grades 7 and 8 are submitted for participation in CASEF.

CASEF is central Pennsylvania's regional program affiliated with the International Science and-Engineering Fair (ISEF). More than 300 students, in grades seven through 12, from 45 schools, displayed projects at CASEF. Student projects are judged in 15 categories and are examined for appropriate topic choice, creative ability, scientific thought, clarity, and thoroughness. Also, students are interviewed about their projects by a judge and must be able to discuss their work knowledgeably. A lucky few — such as Raju — are called back for a second, grand champion, interview.

In addition to Raju, nine Academy students displayed projects. Of these students, seven earned 2nd place and two earned 3rd place, including:

"How Clean is My School?" was the theme of the science fair project of Matthew Lazarus' 15. Lazarus tested to identify the cleanest and dirtiest places at Harrisburg Academy. He won a special award at CASEF and received \$300, in addition to being named Outstanding 7th & 8th Grade Project at Harrisburg Academy's science fair in January.

"Though higher-level topics, I believe Middle School students are ready to engage in these discussions, to wrestle with essential questions about them, and to benefit from new learning strategies," Jorgensen said.

Perhaps one of the more intriguing things about the class is that it's unique to Harrisburg Academy. Jorgensen developed the curriculum herself, at the encouragement of Head of School Jim Newman. Fresh from reading the book, "High Noon: 20 global problems and 20 years to solve them," Dr. Newman approached her and sought her input on using it as the basis of a new Middle School class. The school piloted the course for a semester in the 2009-10 academic year to much success, and expanded it to cover the full academic year in 2010-11.

In addition to the greater themes students study, exploration of and discussion about weekly current events are an important element of the class. Students are required to pick a domestic or international news story, present the story to the class, and describe why the story has a potential global effect. Jorgensen believes that by requiring her students to look at the news every week, they have a greater understanding of the significant things happening in the world. "They're making connections into their real life," she said. "They're talking about world news with their parents, and it is opening dialogue at home — dinner conversation is so much more interesting!"

"I've learned a lot of things about current situations that I haven't known before," Dayna Levine '15 said. "I have learned to look at the news with a different eye and to look at it thoughtfully instead of taking the truth of the information for granted. It's a good tool for setting the building blocks for my future education."





Due to the strong legacy left by apartheid, the country is still very much organized by race. We looked puzzled and told her that there were African Americans in her school and in her class at home. Needless to say, we spent hours at the dinner table and in the car on long drives all around the country talking about race, apartheid, Nelson Mandela, poverty, HIV/AIDS, and how we could teach 7th graders basic math." 




